

...the most inclusive people on this earth

To understand the **Acts of the Apostles** (1:15-7:20-26), we must see the difference between "disciple", "apostle" and "the Twelve". A <u>disciple</u> is anyone who follows Jesus – man or woman. An <u>apostle</u> is a disciple sent out on a specific mission. *Paul* of Tarsus often refers to himself as an apostle – and Paul never saw Jesus. <u>The Twelve</u> are twelve men – probably apostles – whom Jesus chose to accompany him during his preaching ministry in Palestine. Any Jew, hearing the number 12, automatically thinks of the *twelve tribes of Israel* or the twelve *sons of Jacob*.

Scholars believe that Jesus used "the Twelve" as a symbol meaning *all* Jews. Jesus considered people from the less important tribes of Naphtali or Dan just as important as a priest or David's descendants. "The Twelve" were a clear symbol of the *inclusivity Jesus preached and practiced*: Jesus did not want to exclude anyone! Historically, however, there couldn't be any women among the Twelve because they represented Jacob's twelve *sons*. Since the evangelists present different names in the three lists of the Twelve, we presume the "group" was more important than its individual members. John, the last evangelist, *never names them* – they always appear as a group. The Gentile Christians of pagan origin – for whom John wrote – would not have understood *the twelve tribe symbolism*. This symbolism however is important for <u>Luke</u>: he wants to get the number back to twelve in the Acts of the Apostles before the coming of the Holy Spirit. The Spirit's arrival will not only give them the ability to reach out to all people – the *gift of tongues*, but also ensures that this new, spirit-filled community is a gathering of equals.

The author of the **first letter of St. John** couldn't agree more. The Spirit brings a great leveling and homogenizing force that makes people equal and this force arises first from the love God has for <u>us</u>, then from the love <u>we</u> have for <u>God</u> and <u>those around us</u>. "God is love," the author of I John writes, "and those who remain in love remain in God and God in them." There can be no exclusivity when love is involved. **In John's gospel,** Jesus prays for his community during the Last Supper. Jesus presumes they are a unique group of people. His passion for unity comes to the fore. "Holy Father," he prays, "keep them in your name that you have given me, so that they may be one just as we are one." If they are to carry on his ministry, they must reflect his way of thinking, his attitude towards the world. And this mindset of Jesus not only disturbed many around him, it eventually led to his death. "I gave them your word, and the world hated them, because they do not belong to the world any more than I belong to the world." As followers and friends of Jesus, we should reflect the priorities of Jesus; we should care about the "things" about which Jesus was deeply concerned. Among other things, we should be the most inclusive people on this earth. It is up to each and every one of us to consider the social and political implications of this statement.
