On the way to Jerusalem

In the gospel, Jesus is with his reluctant disciples on the way to Jerusalem. In Luke's gospel we read, Jesus set his face *resolutely* toward Jerusalem. Knowing what would expect him there, it certainly was not an easy decision. Jesus struggles with his Abba, but once clear about God's will, he *does not hesitate*.

His disciples find many reasons not to go, but Jesus rebukes them: "Your thoughts are human thinking, not God's". On the way, *God confirms* his decision. In the transfiguration Jesus gets a foretaste of the resurrection. And the disciples are encouraged that this Jesus, whom they will see dying miserably on the cross, is God's beloved son.

What can we learn from Jesus?

- Once he knows this is what God wants, Jesus does not hesitate for a moment. He starts on his way to Jerusalem the place of his death and resurrection.
- We often lack the will to do what we know we should do. We procrastinate and postpone unpleasant actions to tomorrow.

I feel I have to go to the dentist - I postpone it until it really hurts.

I know I should change habits, addictions: I may work too much, eat or drink or smoke too much – I will stop tomorrow! We all know we have to change our lifestyle, our economic system - we don't do it!

We are not prepared to act preventively. What will be in 2030 or 2050 is too far away to motivate us.

There is one more thing we can learn from Jesus: to look with confidence at the future, not only on today's problems.

- Jesus suffered, died and rose from the dead. The experience of the transfiguration confirmed his hope. We tend to get absorbed by our immediate needs and fears.
- Presently, the threat of the coronavirus takes all our attention. The atmosphere in town is changing. We all know that we have to die one day, but all of a sudden, we realise that this distant possibility has become real.
- Jesus accepted to die freely and willingly, because he knew what was awaiting him.

Every time we celebrate the Eucharist, we share in the death and resurrection of Jesus. "Christ has died, Christ has risen, Christ will come again." We should try to live in that expectation. Whatever happens, I am safe in God's hands.

It is easier to face death when you are 81, much more difficult if you have children who need you. So we must do what is necessary and possible to protect ourselves, without losing the hope and joy of life and the serenity in the belief that whatever happens "Everything shall be well", as the great mystic Julian(a) from Norwich said, "all manner of being shall be well."

Pray the Stations of the Cross on April 10th 2 p.m. at All Saints

The Stations of the Cross are a 14-step Catholic devotion that commemorates Jesus Christ's last day on Earth as a man.

The 14 devotions focus on specific events of His last day, beginning with His condemnation. The stations are commonly used as a mini pilgrimage as the individual moves from station to station.

At each station, the individual recalls and meditates on a specific event from Christ's last day. Specific prayers are recited, then the individual moves to the next station until all 14 are complete.
